
Meet the author and discover the 'Hidden History of Napa Valley'

New exhibit showcases police history



Napa Police Historical Society's mission statement says it all: "To honor those who have sacrificed their time and efforts by remembering the past."

Join us at a special preview of an extraordinary new exhibit "Preserve-Honor-Educate" on Friday, August 2 from 5:30-7 p.m. at the Sharpsteen Museum.

The Napa Police Historical Society was founded in 2006 by Todd Shulman, a police officer with a keen interest in history. Since its founding, the Society has collected over 10,000 digital images, nearly 300 unique documents, over 400

insignias, and almost 300 pieces of memorabilia as well as vintage police vehicles.

As much of this collection as possible will be loaded into our five large display cases and ready for your appreciation at the preview grand opening. A media presentation is also in the works.

Shulman, the organization's current Board President, will be present to greet attendees and answer any questions. We also hope to see his fellow Board members, Evangeline Tai, Officer Mike Walund,

New to the Cottage: 100-year-old dolls, spinning wheel

Three new additions to the Sharpsteen Museum Cottage include two century-old dolls and a 1839 spinning wheel.

The first doll is a sweet baby wearing a white bonnet and dress. She came with and is sitting in an unusual wicker carriage. The carriage appears to be built so that a dog or small person could tow it as it has a handle and only two wheels. According to the donor, both the doll and carriage-cart are around 100 years-old.



A second doll is a little girl dressed in white lace. She sits in the middle of the bed watching all of her friends. She was manufactured by a German company, Simon



and Halbig, which was in business from 1869 to 1932. The donor is sure this piece is also over 100 years-old as well.

By the way, we are looking to give lovely,

old-fashioned names to these two new cottage residents. Our first thoughts were Penelope and Prudence, but we would love to hear from you with other ideas.

The next addition to our collection is an 1839 spinning wheel and spinners weasel, which measures the yarn after it is spun. This piece is quite fragile so it has been placed in the barn area.
