In Memoriam

We're so excited...

We have two new additions to our Brannan Cottage!

First is a framed photo of Robert Louis Stevenson (RLS) and his wife, Fanny Osbourne Stevenson.

As you know, our Brannan Cottage was the temporary residence of RLS and new his bride, Fanny, during their honeymoon of 1880, wed May 19 in San Francisco. Here at the Springs Grounds in Calistoga they stayed for a couple of weeks but could not afford to stay longer, with the \$10.00 per week charge. Wanting to stay longer, it was suggested they travel up Mt. St. Helena to the old, abandoned cabins at the Silverado Mine. This they did, being delivered to the original Toll House & Hotel near the east flank of the mountain. As rugged as they found the possible accommodations, they chose to stay and made their home.

Traveling up and down the mountain during those few weeks, RLS made sure to write in his journal all the comings and goings, people met and adventures every step of the way.

As scribed, his journal became *Sketches of a Californian Mountain – Silverado Squatters*. First published in Scotland in 1883; then as a serial in the NY publication *Century Illustrated Monthly Magazine* in 1884. Published in book form by Scribner, NY, in 1895.

Secondly, walk into our Cottage, look to your right into the children's bedroom. You will find a hand-embroidered coverlet depicting the RLS poem *The Land of Counterpane*, donated by museum member and docent Lauren Thollander. The coverlet is circa 1910 and sewn by her grandmother.


Being a sickly child and spending much time confined to his bed, RLS was not able to read until 6-7 years old yet would create stories and poems dictating to his mother and nanny.

In 1885 he compiled those early childhood memories into his book *A Child's Garden of Verses*, published in New York in 1905. One of the poems included is *The Land of Counterpane*.

In the 1800's a "counterpane" was a bed's coverlet. Unable to venture outside to play-- spending long, lonely hours in bed, his imagination became his friend, his counterpane became his world. This is where his toys, soldiers, and ships lived.

RLS and Fanny traveled by ship to a variety of exotic locations, ultimately landing at the port of Apia in the Samoan islands in December of 1889. There they purchased over 300 acres at Vailima, a few miles inland. They built a two-story home and lived until the death of RLS December 3, 1894. During this time, as Fanny was busy managing, organizing, and working the estate, RLS continued writing. It was here that he was given the name "Tusitala" by the locals, which in Samoan means "Teller of Tales".

Robert Louis Stevenson was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, November 13, 1850. When he passed in Samoa, Dec. 3, 1894, of a stroke, their local Samoan friends surrounded him during the night then carried him to nearby Mount Vaea where they buried him in a spot overlooking the sea.



Based on Stevenson's poem *Requiem*, the following epitaph is inscribed on his tomb:

*Under the wide and starry sky
Dig his grave and let me lie
Glad I live and gladly die
And laid me down with a will
This be the verse you grave for me
Here he lies where he longed to be
Home is the sailor home from the sea
And the hunter home from the hill*

Frances "Fanny" Van de Grift Osbourne-Stevenson was born March 10, 1840 in Indianapolis, IN. Always known as

“The mountains are calling and I must go,” -John Muir.

The Ken Stanton Trifecta (an achievement that involves 3 successful outcomes). Any one of these three titles, written by local author Ken Stanton, will inspire you to take a step into the adventures you’ve only been dreaming about, time to do it!

Each title is informational, filled with stories, history, and photos.

1. *No Mere Pastime – A Life in High Places*

“With a keen eye for the beauty of the natural world, Stanton leads readers from the mountains of California, to the snows of the Canadian Rockies, to the overhanging limestone walls of Italy’s Dolomite, to the monarchs of the alpine world, the Himalaya.” You will join the author as he paddles the whitewater of the Trinity River, makes a one day descent of Tenaya Canyon (Yosemite), as he takes a fifty foot swing on the final, massive overhangs of El Capitan, and more. Softcover, 260 pages, with color photos, 8.5”x5.5”, cost \$28.00/copy.

2. *Mount St. Helena- Robert Louis Stevenson State Park- A History and Guide*

Kana'mota (Human Mountain) is the name given Mt. St. Helena by the native Wappo hundreds of years ago. Hiking up to her summit at 4,343 ft. on a clear day, views of the Pacific Ocean, downtown San Francisco, the Sierra Nevada, and Mt. Shasta can be seen. “Through extensive research and on the ground field work, author Ken Stanton has come to know the mountain intimately and brings to light its story with clear prose, historical and contemporary photographs and anecdotes from the old timers who lived its history.” Included are chapters on flora and fauna, plus a pull-out map to lead you on your hiking journey. Curious about the White Cap Murder Gang of 1890? Why the mountain is volcanic but not a volcano? What was the connection to Leland Stanford and Richard Henry Dana? Answers and more are found within these pages. Softcover, 256 pages, 9”x6”, photos, maps, cost \$20.00/copy.

3. *Great Day Hikes In & Around Napa Valley*

“The valley offers outstanding hiking. Reading these engrossing descriptions makes you feel as if you’re on a guided tour.” -*Sunset Magazine*. “Napa offers a rare pairing of wine and wilderness.” “...have created misty forests, petrified trees, striking rock formations and peaks with sweeping views.” The marvelous Palisades Trail, historic Oat Hill Mine Trail, sheltered redwood canyons in Bothe State Park, see eagles and elk in the Cache Creek wilderness. Your personal adventures to explore. Softcover, 231 pgs. with photos and maps, 8”x5.5”, cost \$12.00/copy.





a tomboy with dark, curly hair, a writer herself in the highest regard and known as “a woman of intellectual attainments”, it is without question that her life had brought her to Grez-sur-Loing where she and RLS first met in 1876. Three children were born to her and first husband Samuel Osbourne, Isobel (Belle), Lloyd and Hervey (died 1875).

After the death of RLS, Fanny moved back to San Francisco, then to Santa Barbara. Her last companion (and Belle’s to-be husband), Ned Field, described her as “the only woman in the world worth dying for”. Fanny passed in Santa Barbara February 10, 1914. The following year, per Fanny’s wishes, her ashes were by taken by her daughter, Belle, to Samoa where they were interred next to her husband on top of Mount Vaea. The bronze plaque for Fanny bears her name as she was known in Samoa- “Aolele”, meaning “Flying Cloud.”

A love story for the ages, Tusitala and Aolele now rest together for all eternity.
