"Well known for its picturesque setting, Napa County is also home to crimes perpetrated in the name of greed, love and rage."


Investigative history at its best. A Question & Answer period will follow the lecture, and next step for you is to have your copy autographed by the man himself.

# Vintage Brannan Cottage Quilt Comes Home

Beginning in 1978, the Sharpsteen volunteers spent months creating a hand-sewn quilt. The quilting work would be done in the museum for daily visitors to witness and buy raffle tickets. The quilt would be completed by early December to be displayed at the Annual Christmas Bazaar where more tickets would be sold. The winning ticket would be pulled at the end of that day.

In 1979 the first Brannan Cottage Quilt was created. It was a rainy November day when Audrey Brown from Virginia accompanied her husband on a business trip to Calistoga. As she wandered into the museum, she met the ladies working on the quilt, and was so impressed she bought 3 tickets. Her name was drawn as the winner at the Bazaar that fateful December afternoon.

She loved her quilt, even put together a scrapbook of memories surrounding her win which will be passed on to the ultimate winner & highest bidder. Sadly, Audrey passed away recently. Her daughter Wendy contacted the museum stating, "the quilt was so precious to my mother, she would have wanted it returned to the museum." Wendy also told us that her mother never used the quilt, it was always hung to display.

This vintage Brannan Cottage Quilt is now in our possession. It measures 72" x 90" and took over 1200 hours to complete as a joint effort of dedicated volunteers. It is displayed in our Brannan Cottage and will be placed on <u>Silent</u> <u>Auction</u> August 1<sup>st</sup>- November 30. Opening bid will be \$100.00, subsequent bids in \$25.00 increments. The Silent Auction list will be kept at our front counter. If you are unable to visit the museum to add your name & bid, simply call the museum and give your information to the volunteer on duty. The volunteer can tell you the highest bid at that point.

As we remain an all-volunteer, non-profit museum, the auction of this quilt will help fund our ongoing operations. Take advantage of this unimaginable opportunity to own a piece of Sharpsteen history.


