A "Reason" to Celebrate at Canard Vineyard, May 19, 2023

A gorgeous spring day, a master garden in full flower, an historic vineyard boasting some of the oldest zinfandel vines in Napa Valley planted by Calistoga Pioneer Reason P. Tucker— and, among the lively, happy crowd tasting wine and strolling among the flower beds, a few descendants of the Tucker Family got acquainted and swapped stories. This supremely joyful day, made possible by the generosity of hosts Carolyn & Rich Czapleski, owners of Canard Vineyard, raised \$5,790 for the museum. It also served as a kickoff event for our next special exhibit highlighting the life and legacy of Tucker, perhaps best known as one of the rescuers of Donner Party survivors — a fascinating and noteworthy life, indeed.

There was a full-circle symmetry to the day. Tucker's great-great-great granddaughter, Jean Sawday of St. Helena, was there with her husband Chuck, the realtor who sold Reason P. Tucker's Property - a dilapidated redwood house built in 1858, *Continued See REASON* pg 2

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and 25 acres of heritage vineyards - to the newlywed Czapleskis forty years ago. A front-page Napa Register story on the Czapleskis' restoration of Tucker's former home and the wine they make from 130-year-old vines Tucker planted caught the attention of Charles & Rob Vanoncini of Napa. (Charles is Reason P. Tucker's great-great-great grandson, and son Rob is Tucker's great-great-great grandson). While cousins Sawday and the Vanoncinis hadn't met previously, they greeted each other warmly and shared memories of their intertwined family histories.

Later this month, the Sharpsteen will unveil a special exhibit on Tucker and his legacy. Tucker lived in Napa Valley for 24 years. In addition to planting vineyards, he built the Tucker School next door to his property on Dunaweal Lane. During his life, he and four wives had ten children, some of whom settled in Napa Valley. He lost his property in a lawsuit that wound up in the California Supreme Court in 1872, and moved to Goleta, near Santa Barbara, where he lived until his death in 1888 at the age of 82. Canard Vineyard owners Rich & Carolyn Czapleski named one of their wines *The Rescuer* in Tucker's honor. The Bordeaux blend is 90% Merlot, with 8% Cabernet Sauvignon and 2% Cabernet Franc.

The Reason P. Tucker Exhibit will feature personal artifacts including his rifle, copies of deeds to his homestead, the cast iron bell from the Tucker School lent by Linda Shaw, and a timeline of his life, as well as a collection of objects providing a sense of everyday life in the latter half of the 19th century. Stay tuned for more information on the opening date of this exhibit.

Our sincere thanks to Carolyn & Rich Czapleski for their extraordinary support of the museum. On top of this highly successful event, the proceeds from the sale of their two rosé wines will be split between the Sharpsteen and the Tucker Farm Center, which is raising funds for a new roof.

Education Highlights

School Group Tour has Sharpsteen Family Connection

On April 21st Sharpsteen Museum hosted a group of 5 instructors and 12 students from the Glenn County Office of Education Success One! Charter School and Glenn Adult Program.

The museum was their first stop on this full day of travel (next stop after lunch was a visit to the Robert Louis Stevenson Museum in St. Helena). Field Trip Coordinator and Instructor Brian "Butch" Peterson said they prepared for this day by studying the life and work of Ben Sharpsteen. Ben's son, Tom Sharpsteen, was Butch's sixth-grade teacher at Fairview School in Orland, CA and the two enjoyed a lifetime friendship.

The students were interested in Ben's Disney career, early Northern California History and Culture, and practicing their English-speaking skills. And, of course, the Star Wars exhibit was a big hit.

St. Helena Historical Society- Historian Mariam Hansen's recent lecture, "Stevenson's Napa Valley", followed RLS and new bride Fanny as they traveled up the Napa Valley - the Sharpsteen Museum provided many of the Calistoga photos, and there is even a print of Ben's painting depicting the St. Helena Train Depot included in her presentation. 


REASURE

Dodge City: Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, and the Wickedest Town in the American West, by New York Times bestselling author, Tom Clavin.




People of the Water, a novella of the events leading to the Bloody Island Massacre of

1850, by Kathleen Scavone MA.

Told in story form and based on interviews as provided by the Clear Lake Pomo Culture Tribal Elders in the late 1800's to early 1900's. After years of enslavement, starvation and abuse by Andrew Kelsey & Charles Stone, the Pomo gathered to kill both evil men. They succeeded. To avenge Kelsey and Stone, the US Calvary sent enumerable troops to Lake County, found Pomo families living on an island in the lake and proceeded to slaughter 200-600 Pomo men, women, and children. If they couldn't shoot or beat them, the innocents were simply drowned. This piece of local history is known as the Bloody Island Massacre.

Two separate historical markers record the site. One placed by the Native Sons of the Golden West on May 20, 1942 located 0.3 miles off Highway 20 on Reclamation Rd. The second is CA State Historical Landmark # 427 describing the location as the scene of the massacre, placed on Highway 20 at the Reclamation Rd. intersect on May 15, 2005. Cost \$12.99, 100 pgs.
