New Exhibit in May-Treasures From the Button Box



The Sonoma County Button Club, in celebration of its 70^{th} year, is proud to present "Treasures from the Button Box", opening in May at the Sharpsteen Museum.

The exhibit will feature clothing buttons from the late 1700s to the 1960s. These small works of art capture a long-ago world, recalling memories of old clothing and forgotten ancestors, while evoking the pride, independence and quality of small manufacturers. The Industrial Revolution of 1760 to 1840 brought a wider variety of button materials to more people. Buttons were stashed in a basket, box or tin and passed down through the generations, often with stories about the folks who wore them.

Since the late 1930s serious collectors have created an elaborate button classification system, establishing 1918 as the cutoff year between old and modern buttons. Reference books have been published and clubs across the United States and around the world meet to study, trade and buy buttons. Collectors attend state and local button shows (the public is always welcome) as well as the National Button Society's annual show, entering their 9" x 12" "trays" of favorite buttons in competition for a coveted first, second or third prize.

The public is invited to come by and meet members of the Sonoma County Button Club as they unveil their collection of buttons at the "Preview Party" on Friday, May 13 from 5:30 to 7pm. Enjoy some light refreshments and live music as well.

Jo was born in Montana but raised in the San Juan Islands of western Washington since the




age of 2 small years. Finding her way to Calistoga is a story in and of itself, but here we speak of "our" Jo.

Over time, Jo has been involved in a variety of careers, hobbies and volunteer endeavors. She is the only surviving member of the Sharpsteen's Incorporation board and has been a museum advocate since 1976, two full years prior to the museums being completed. In addition to her job as Assoc. Planner for the City of Calistoga, she served on the Boards of Napa County Landmarks, Calistoga Music Boosters, and American Field Service. Jo also holds the distinction of being the first "Citizen of the Year", awarded her in 1986 by our local Chamber.

Highlights of her museum Presidency include chairing the museum's "First 25 Years" celebration with a unique special exhibit that included 13 exhibitors, all Sharpsteen members. Jo is also known for her over-the-top museum floats always seen in our 4th of July Parades (remember the great Suffragette float?), and the annual Rummage Sale, once a huge fund raising event.

Jo has spent innumerable years in different capacities on our Board of Directors, has chaired events, committees, fund raisers-- her dedicated involvement seems endless. Jo tells us that she is most fond of the 10 years of chairing and developing the children's Summer Reading Program in concert with the Napa City/County Library, a program still going strong today.

Most importantly, Jo reminds us that Ben Sharpsteen believed the museum should be free because "those who are most in need of a cultural experience are least able to afford it."

Thank you Jo, for a lifetime of unselfish dedication and for being a stalwart protector of Ben Sharpsteen's dream.
