

New at the Museum



New titles on our shelves include "The 12 Days of Christmas", a peek-through book. Beginning with a partridge in a pear tree, each page with cut outs expose more of each day's offerings.

In "Stowaway in a Sleigh" you will follow Slipper the kitty as he finds himself flying through the heavens with Santa himself, and learns quickly that there is no place like home.

These docents work on a strictly volunteer basis, as do all the members of the staff. In fact, since becoming a docent, I have discovered that most docents are the ones filling other staff positions.

Docent Bev Barnes is in charge of the permanent collection. She spends countless hours adding to the collection, keeping it in order, and seeing that it is displayed in an exciting way. Bev has also overseen the project to replace museum lighting for a brighter, more welcoming look.


